Theft, Liability, and the Costs You Can See

According to [Liberty Mutual's 2024 Workplace Safety Index](#), workplace slip-and-fall injuries cost U.S. employers nearly \$10 billion annually in medical expenses and lost-wage claims. Add shoplifting, employee theft, and vendor fraud on top of that, and the losses compound quickly.

But the less-visible costs add up, too. Unresolved customer disputes that turn into refunds or legal exposure. Workers' compensation claims with no supporting documentation. Vandalism that happens overnight with no record of how or when.

Liability is a growing concern for SMBs specifically. Slip-and-fall claims, parking lot incidents, and employee disputes all carry financial and legal risk. Businesses without reliable footage often have no way to verify what happened, which puts them in a poor negotiating position regardless of the facts.

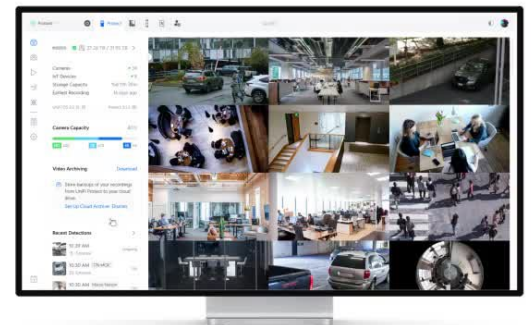

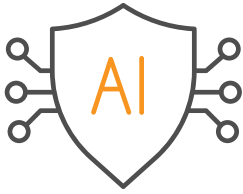
Customer Safety and Confidence

The discrepancy is identified and documented in under ten minutes.*

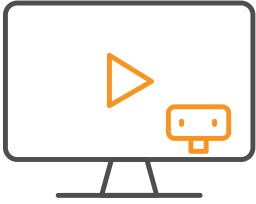


Remote Monitoring

Centralized Management
